Islam Awareness Week

This year, Islam Awareness Week took place from 23-29 May 2016. This is an annual national event which was established by the Islamic Society of Britain in 1994.

It is a week when there is heightened media and public interest in Islam and therefore provides an excellent opportunity for Ahmadi Muslims to promote a better understanding of the peaceful teachings of Islam and to create a positive interest in Islam. Lajna were encouraged to hold exhibitions, school talks, seminars, and study circles as many establishments are more receptive to hearing from us and displaying posters and/or literature during this time. This was combined with Lajna's on-going commitment to serve their communities and highlight the service of humanity as an essential tenet of Islam.

The following is a snapshot of Lajna's initiatives across the UK during this week.

Mini Packs of Sweets and Information sheets

For Islam Awareness Week, **Manchester South** Lajna put together small packages of sweets and a mini information sheet. The information sheet included messages of peace, sayings from the Holy Prophet (peace be upon him), translations of Urdu Poem "Islam se na bhago", as well as information sent by the local Nasirat secretary and an article from the local Tarbiyyat secretary. These sheets were put into little packets of sweets and more than 90 packs were distributed to Tabligh contacts.





Exhibition

A two-day exhibition on Peace and Humanity First was held between Monday 23 May and Wednesday 25 May at St. John's Centre in Old Trafford. The exhibition provided a great opportunity for Tabligh with several guests enquiring about Ahmadiyyat and others sympathising with the persecution of Ahmadis worldwide.



On Thursday 25 May 2016, **Blackburn Lajna** held a library exhibition on Islam Awareness. It was a successful event- 30 Holy Qurans were on display in different languages. All visitors were very inspired by the Exhibition. When a guest named Gail read the verses of the Holy Quran she began crying. Another guest commented that she was happy to see a peaceful message. The library staff were so impressed that they have offered Blackburn Lajna several other opportunities for organising exhibitions.







About 50 people took interest in the exhibition and were given leaflets and literature.




Poems and art at Barkingside library to explain Qu'ran during Islam Awareness Week



Ahmadiyya Muslims from Barking brought gifts to the elderly in a bid to spread their message of "love for all, hatred for none".

Bringing hampers of fruit, bunches of flowers and tins of biscuits, the Barking branch of the minority Muslim organisation hoped to honour what it believes to be a central principle of Islam – charity.

Saimah Ahmed, 37, said looking out for the elderly is a key part of her faith after she and four other women dropped off their donations at Chestnut Care Home in Frizlands Lane, Dagenham.

"The elderly in Islam are given a lot of respect because of their age and experience," she said. "The residents were really happy with our donations and we enjoyed the visit.

Saimah said the donations on Tuesday last week were given as part of Islamic Awareness Week, which she believes gives Muslims everywhere an opportunity to showcase the finest parts of their faith.

"Islamic awareness week is a good time to raise awareness about real Islamic teachings," she said.

"The key thing is about peace and caring for people in the community – this is what Islam is about."

Saimah said the ladies' group that visited the home will continue to support the elderly in Barking and Dagenham and hopes to donate to the home again soon.
