Ahmadiyya Muslim Women's Association UK Hosts Annual Peace Symposium

"Women as Ambassadors for Peace"

London, UK - 22 June 2025 - The Ahmadiyya Muslim Women's Association UK hosted its annual Peace Symposium today with the theme: "Women as Ambassadors for Peace." The event brought together women of all faiths, professions, and backgrounds to explore how spiritual values and moral leadership can help shape a more just and compassionate world.

The symposium was held on 22 June, in Britain's largest mosque, Baitul Futuh in South London and was attended by over 550 community leaders, faith representatives, journalists, and members of the public. The gathering serves as a platform to promote dialogue, mutual respect, and a shared understanding in the face of rising global tensions and societal divisions.

The event highlighted the work of grassroots charities supporting women, children, and the environment including the Guildford based halow project which supports young adults with learning disabilities and autism across Surrey and featured keynote addresses by women working on peacebuilding at the local, national, and global level.

When women have equal access as men to agricultural resources, it has been proven that they produce more, feed more, and they have the ability to lift communities out of hunger."

About the Ahmadiyya Muslim Women's Association UK

The Ahmadiyya Muslim Women's Association UK is a national Muslim Women's group established in 1922 with more than 14,000 members across Britain. It is an auxiliary organisation of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community UK which was established in Britain in 1913.

The Community has approximately 33,000 members across more than 100 chapters. The Community built the Fazl Mosque in Southfields London in 1924 which was the first Mosque in London and also the Baitul Futuh Mosque in South London, the largest Mosque in the UK.

The Community was founded in 1889 by Hadhrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad (peace be upon him) who claimed to be the Promised Messiah and Mahdi awaited by all major religions, including the Jews, Christians and Muslims. The Ahmadiyya Muslim Community is now established in more than 200 countries with tens of millions of members worldwide. Its motto is "Love for All, Hatred for None".

The Ahmadiyya Muslim Community is the largest organised Muslim Community in the world and is led by a system of spiritual successorship known as Khilafat. Its current Khalifa is the fifth successor to the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him); his name is His Holiness, Mirza Masroor Ahmad. His title is Hadhrat Khalifatul Masih V.

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
