How can we spread the message of Islam in our schools without any reservations?



Huzoor (aba) explained that to spread the message of Islam in schools, one must first develop courage. There is no need for embarrassment – if people already know that you are a Muslim, then stand by your faith with confidence. The best way to convey Islam's message is through one's own example and this is by showing good character, honesty, kindness and service to others and making it clear that these qualities come from Islamic teachings.

Furthermore, Huzoor (aba) counselled to address misconceptions with honesty and courage by openly acknowledging that the wrongful actions of some Muslims are contrary to the true faith, just as crime exists in every community without defining their entire religion. By speaking without fear, clearly distinguishing between the teachings of Islam and the misdeeds of individuals, one can effectively remove doubts and present the truth of Islam with confidence.

Huzoor (aba) said that when Muslims make mistakes or commit wrong acts, it should be openly acknowledged that such behaviour is contrary to Islam. This honesty helps people see the difference between Islam's pure teachings and the weaknesses of individuals.

Huzoor (aba) gave his own example, saying that in his sermons he clearly points out the shortcomings among Muslims and then explains the true teachings of Islam and this openness helps remove misconceptions and fears people have about the faith.

Huzoor (aba) reminded that wrongdoing exists in every community including among atheists, Jews, Christians, Hindus – but those actions do not define the religion itself. Therefore, Muslims should speak about Islam fearlessly and truthfully, showing that Islam promotes goodness and condemns wrongdoing. Through courage, clarity and good example, others will come to see the beauty and truth of Islam.

"My experience with Tabligh has been really valuable for me. At first, I thought it was mainly about explaining Islam to others, but I've come to realise it's just as much about improving myself.

When I've spoken to people of different faiths, I've learnt how important it is to approach with respect, patience and kindness rather than just trying to convert someone.

One of the biggest lessons I've learnt is that success in Tabligh isn't about the outcome but it's about the effort, the sincerity, and leaving the rest to Allah. Often, the best Tabligh is our character and how we treat others."

At first, I wondered whether it would make any difference, but later they told me it gave them a new perspective they hadn't considered before.


It reminded me that Tabligh doesn't always have to be a long conversation—sometimes a small effort, like sending an article or recommending a video, can open a person's mind.








TAHIRA HASSAN MAJLIS: SOUTHALL

What is Tabligh? Is it simply a smile or a "hello" that starts the journey to Islam? My name is Bushra, and I am 11 years old. My mother is the Tabligh secretary in the Mitcham Park Jamaat.

A couple of weeks ago, my mother, my sisters, and I went to Beddington Park — and there, Allah showed us how He can guide us in so many ways.

As my sisters and I played in the park, we decided to line up for the zip line. While waiting, a woman and her two-year-old son stood behind us. We decided to let her go first. That small act of kindness opened an unread story — a story written by Allah.

The woman began speaking with my mother, and the first word that opened this conversation was Assalamu Alaikum. She was a Christian who had converted to Islam after being guided through dreams. Later, we all walked to the river together and fed the birds. We shared our bird food with her and her little son, and it felt like we were sharing more than just food — we were sharing love, peace, and the message of Islam.



Spotlight on: Halloween

Guidance from Hazrat Khalifatul Masih V (aba)

Halloween originates from old Irish pagan practices and is based on concepts belonging to witches; concepts which trample upon religion and sanctity of homes. No matter how much fun it may be considered, its very basis is wrong and it includes shirk. Because its basic concept is that on 31 October the boundaries between the living and the dead are removed and the dead come back to cause harm to the living. In order to avoid being harmed, about which many nonsensical things are said, socalled magicians are called in who take animals and crops from people and sacrifice them in a specific way.



Bonfire is also part of the ritual and is meant to frighten the dead. The special costumes and masks are also worn to scare. Christianity adopted this ritual, in particular the Catholic Church. Due to Christianity and also the media Halloween spread all over the world, in particular in the West; in USA, Canada, UK, Japan, New Zealand, Australia and other European countries.

This practice is a hidden evil. Muslims in the West are adopting it. Children dress up in costumes and go from door to door asking for something to bring comfort to spirits. The notion is that if a household gives something to the costume-clad children the dead would not harm the household. Indeed, it is all considered good fun, but the idea behind it all is based on shirk. It is against the dignity of an Ahmadi child to dress up in strange manner and go door to door like beggars, even if it is for chocolates. Ahmadis should have a dignity which should be inculcated from childhood.

The message of Halloween is thus of existence of witches, evil spirits and satanic worship. It is extremely wrong to 'believe in' things that are 'supernatural' even if it is for fun. For this reason, our children should strictly avoid them.
